The Prince Alwaleed Award





About the Prince Alwaleed Award

Who can apply & what is it for?

The Prince Alwaleed Award is a prestigious scholarship available to students who take at least 60 credits a year from modules hosted by the Institute of Arab & Islamic Studies (IAIS) at the University of Exeter.

This award provides students with the unique opportunity to deepen their understanding of the Arabic-speaking world through immersive experiences that extend beyond their designated time abroad, which is typically a part of their degree programmes. It aims to enhance their Arabic language proficiency and cultural knowledge, offering a significant advantage that is not commonly available to many students.

In brief, the funding can be used for one of two primary purposes:

- Study of Arabic at an Appropriate Institution in Arabic-speaking Countries: Such an
 immersive environment is invaluable for language acquisition, providing students with the
 chance to practice their language skills in real-life situations, engage with native speakers,
 and gain a deeper understanding of the cultural nuances that cannot be fully grasped in a
 classroom setting. If circumstances prevent travel, students may use the funds to study
 Arabic online through reputable institutions, ensuring that their language education
 continues uninterrupted.
- 2. Travel to the MENA Region for Dissertation Research: The second option supports students who need to conduct research in the Middle East and North Africa (MENA) region for their dissertations. This funding enables students to gather primary data, access resources that are not available outside the region, and conduct interviews or field work that are critical for their research projects. This hand-on experience is crucial for producing high-quality, original research that contributes to the academic field of Arab and Islamic Studies.

The award is named in honour of HRH Prince Alwaleed bin Talal Al Saud, a businessman and philanthropist known for his contributions to education and cultural exchange. His support has been instrumental in fostering better understanding and cooperation between the Arab world and the West. The reward reflects his commitment to education and intercultural dialogue, providing students with the means to pursue their academic and professional goals in the field of Arab and Islamic Studies.

What are the benefits of the Award?

Students who receive the Prince Alwaleed Award benefit in several significant ways:

- Enhanced Language Skills: Immersive experiences are among the most effective methods
 for language learning. By spending time in Arabic-speaking environments, students can
 practice and refine their Arabic language skills, achieving a higher level of proficiency that
 can greatly benefit their future careers.
- Cultural Competence: Living and studying in Arabic-speaking countries helps students
 develop a deeper cultural awareness and global sensitivity. This experience is invaluable
 for those who aspire to work in international fields such as diplomacy, international
 business, or global non-profits.
- 3. **Research Opportunities:** For those conducting research, the ability to travel to the MENA region and access local resources can be a game-changer. It allows for the collection of first-hand data, the ability to engage with local scholars and experts, and a richer, more nuanced understanding of the research topic.
- 4. Professional Development: The experiences and skills gained through this award can enhance a student's resumé and make them more competitive in the job market. Award Conditions and Criteria

The award is for IAIS students who are citizens of countries outside the Arab world. The award cannot contribute to the costs of visiting an Arab country to gain work experience, participate in unpaid or voluntary work, visit friends or family, or assist with writing an essay for a module (except the dissertation or other theses).

The amount awarded varies according to the programme of study you are currently undertaking; please see below details of the programmes which are eligible for this studentship and the amount awarded.

IAIS Undergraduate Students

Undergraduates on IAIS single or combined honours programmes may apply annually for funding of up to £1,000 for one of the following purposes:

- Study of Arabic at an appropriate institution in an Arabic-speaking country, or online where circumstances demand it.
- Travel to the Arabic-speaking world to undertake research for a dissertation (prior to final examinations).

University of Exeter undergraduate students studying Arabic at IAIS as an optional module

Students currently registered on an Arabic module at IAIS **who have also previously successfully completed an IAIS Arabic module** may apply for the award for up to £1,000 for the study of Arabic at an appropriate institution in an Arabic-speaking country, or online where circumstances demand it.

Undergraduate students from Flexible Combined Honours or Liberal Arts

Students who are studying at least 60 credits of modules at IAIS are eligible to apply for an award of up to £1,000 for the same purposes as IAIS undergraduate students. The student must be studying at least 60 credits of modules at IAIS in each year they apply.

IAIS MA Programmes (1-Year)

Students undertaking any of the following 1-year IAIS MA Programme are eligible to apply for the award for up to £1,500 to either study Arabic at an appropriate institution in an Arabic-speaking country (or online where circumstances demand it) or to travel to the Arabic-speaking world to undertake research for their dissertation.

- MA Gender Studies (Middle East & Islamic World)
- MA Gulf Studies
- MA Islamic Studies
- MA Middle East Politics
- MA Middle East Studies
- MA Palestine Studies
- MRes Middle East Studies

MArabic in Arabic and Islamic Studies

£1,500 (Stage 4) for additional Arabic study or research for dissertation (minimum of two weeks) in an Arabic-speaking country following the compulsory Study Abroad placement in term 1 or in Easter vacation prior to final examinations.

IAIS MA Programmes (2-Year)

£1,500 for additional Arabic studying or research for dissertation (minimum of two weeks) in an Arabic-speaking country. The award is not to be used to pay for flights for the compulsory Study Abroad placement alone. However, if students wish to extend their compulsory period of study with an additional course of study (minimum of two weeks), Alwaleed funded flights could be used to cover both. In the second year of study, £1,500 is available also for Arabic language study and dissertation fieldwork.

IAIS MA Programmes (2-Year)

Funding of up to £2,000 is available to support PhD students in Arabic language studies or fieldwork/research in an Arabic-speaking country. Awards are made on the basis of academic excellence.

IAIS PhD Programmes

Awards of up to £2,000 are available to support PhD students for Arabic language study or fieldwork in an Arabic-speaking country attached to an Arab educational and/or research institution. Awards are made based on ethics approval and academic excellence of the candidate.

Please note, the amounts listed above are for full-time IAIS students only. Part-time (50%) students may apply for up to half of these amounts dependent on their programme of study

Application Process & Required Documentation

Applications must be submitted at least 6 weeks in advance of travel and no later. Any applications which attempt to claim the award as a reimbursement for previous travel will be rejected.

In order to apply for this award, students must complete the application form (found at the end of this document) in its entirety. Students must also provide copies of:

- A word-processed rationale for the intended trip (of 800-1,000 words), detailing where you wish to go abroad and the benefits this will have on your study. This document must also include some reference that you have considered and evaluated any significant risks and/or recommendations by the UK government for your intended country of travel.
- Complete Prince Alwaleed Award Application Form (found at end of booklet)
- A signed academic reference from your language tutor, general academic tutor and/or dissertation supervisor following their evaluation of the above noted rationale, including a statement that they are in agreement with your travel plans and the intended benefits.

On approval of the above documentation, students must submit:

- Full and completed Risk Assessment (In Country)

In order to receive this award, students must purchase travel insurance through the university's own insurance provider.

Terms and Conditions

The Award Committee may not approve awards intended for travel to areas when Foreign Office alerts are given, or where there may be particular concern for your safely. Recipients of the reward must also show evidence that they have signed up for daily or weekly updates from gov.uk regarding their intended country of travel (https://www.gov.uk/foreign-travel-advice).

Should your application be successful, within two weeks of your return to the UK you **must** submit your expenses, accompanied by **all receipts totaling the amount awarded to you**. We accept that in certain regions/countries formal receipts are harder to come by, therefore we accept signed and dated records of amounts in handwritten format or email.

Please note that the amounts listed are ceilings, and receipts **must** be submitted to justify expenditure. If not done, students will be liable to return unreconciled funds back to the university.

Acceptable expenses with received funds include, but not limited to:

- Food
- Non-alcoholic beverages
- Translation services
- Transport (Car Hire (including insurance), taxi fares, airport transfer(s), coach, bus, aeroplane, water ferry, etc.)
- Accommodation
- Course/Programme costs
- Conference Fees
- Insurance costs
- Inoculation/Vaccination fees
- Study materials
- Guided tours

Unacceptable expenses with received funds include, but not limited to:

- Clothing
- Toys
- Electrical goods
- Souvenirs
- General/non-cultural leisure activities (eg. Cinema tickets, shisha, etc.)
- Alcoholic beverages
- Purchasing of live animals
- Assistant fees

Only one scholarship may be awarded per student academic year (October to September). If your application is unsuccessful, you are welcome to submit a revised application. If you are successful, you may not apply again until the following October.

General Travel Advice

As you prepare for your journey to study Arabic abroad, it's essential to understand that cultural nuances and differences will significantly shape your experience. Mastering the language is just one part of the adventure; immersing yourself in the local culture is equally important, and it is important to remember certain things:

Embracing Local Hospitality

Hospitality is a cornerstone of many cultures in the MENA region. As a guest, you will often be treated with exceptional kindness and generosity, which can sometimes be overwhelming if you're not accustomed to it. Embrace this hospitality by accepting invitations, participating in communal meals, and learning the etiquette around gift-giving.

Respecting Social Hierarchies

Understanding and respecting social hierarchy and the importance of elders is crucial. In many Arabic-speaking countries showing deference to older individuals and those in authority is highly valued. This respect is demonstrated through the use of formal titles, respectful language, and certain behaviours. Adhering to these norms will help you build positive relationships and avoid misunderstandings.

Navigating Dress Codes

Dress codes in the MENA region generally emphasise modesty and therefore be mindful of local expectations. Dress codes can vary significantly between urban and rural areas, and between more conservative and liberal countries. Researching and respecting these norms before you arrive will prevent discomfort and ensure smoother integration into the community.

Understanding Dialectical Differences

While Modern Standard Arabic (MSA) is taught in most formal education settings, spoken Arabic varies widely across the region. Each country – and even regions within countries – has its own dialect, which can be both a challenge and an opportunity. While you may initially struggle with dialectical differences, mastering the local dialect will greatly enhance your ability to communicate effectively and form deeper connections with native speakers.
